

BRIEF HISTORY OF CHRIST CHURCH COLLEGE

Christ Church College, Kanpur has the glorious distinction of being the oldest college of the city. Established in 1866, the College has completed 153 years of supreme educational service and standards. The College began as S.P.G. Mission School in the 1840's to educate Christian children and those who chose it. First called Mission School, then Christ Church School, it grew into a college affiliated first to the Calcutta University in 1866, then to the Allahabad University in 1892, later to the Agra University in 1927, and last, to the Kanpur University (now the C.S.J.M. University) in 1966. It is now a minority co-ed college of the C.N.I. Agra Diocese, managed by the Christ Church College Society. Its Governing Body comprises eminent members under the Chairmanship of the C.N.I. Bishop of Agra.

The History of Christ Church College is the story of an institution which is continuously striving for excellence. The College had a modest beginning as a Free School and in time to come emerged as the leading college of the city, nay province. The long list of illustrious alumni, which reads like a veritable who's who in the echelons of power and society, is testimony to our quality education and excellence.

In the 1830s, a Free School was started to educate the children of army personnel stationed in Cawnpore (as Kanpur was then called), under the joint management of Garrison Chaplains and the military. In 1837, it was handed over to the S.P.G. missionaries. In 1861, Rev. S.D. Burrell, a Cambridge scholar from England, took charge of the school and renamed it Christ Church School, after Christ Church, located in the same compound. College education started in Christ Church School in 1866, with an initial affiliation to the Calcutta University. It was the first institution in the city, to offer University education for the First examination in Arts (F.A.), as the Intermediate examination was then called. The College was fortunate to have at the helm, men of dedication and dynamism. Their forward looking vision, stellar ability and continuous pursuit of educational excellence, took the College to new heights. In 1889, Rev. G.H. Westcott and his younger brother, Rev. C. F. Westcott, renamed the school as Christ Church Collegiate School and began building and enlarging the school premises. In 1892 the institution was affiliated to the Allahabad University. Twelve students were admitted to the first batch of F.A. The Westcott appointed men of commitment both from England and the region as faculty. The subjects English, History, Sanskrit, Persian and Arabic were added in 1892, Mathematics in 1893, Philosophy in 1896, followed by Economics and Law in 1897. Evening classes in book-keeping, short-hand and correspondence were also conducted from 1893. Soon Rev. Westcott began calling his school, a college.

In 1896, Rev. Arthur Crosthwaite opened a hostel, the first of its kind in the province, to provide students from other districts residential facilities and a conducive atmosphere to pursue their studies. In the same year, the first B.A classes were opened. A new and enlarged college building

was inaugurated in 1897 and soon law classes were added to the curriculum. These continued for the next nine years till 1906, producing a large number of eminent lawyers.

Post Graduation studies in the classes started with M.A. in English as early as 1899 with subsequent addition of other subjects like Philosophy and Mathematics. In 1901, the college received a grant of land from the Government to be used for games and sports. As a result, students could win championships in football, volleyball, basketball, hockey and tennis at the district, state and national levels. In 1903, three new classrooms, the current Principal's office, college office and the Girls' common room were built from donations received from different sources. An association of teachers and students, past and present, called -The College Institutie- was formed under the leadership of Rev. Crosthwaite in 1903. In July 1904, the first edition of the College Magazine was brought out, followed by many interesting and erudite issues.

Rev. Crosthwaite was Principal from 1911-12. He converted and extended the three rooms built in 1903 into the Westcott Memorial Library. Mr. M.S. Douglas became Principal in 1912, with Mr. E.W. Omerod assisting him as Vice-Principal. Mr. Douglas was of the opinion that degree courses were best restricted to the University. He felt that Christ Church College should be only an Intermediate College. With this in mind, he discontinued the Degree classes in 1922. However, he retired in 1923. Mr. S.C. Chatterji, who took over as Principal, disagreed with this idea and urged the Governing Body to permit him to resume B.A. Classes in 1926, thus restoring the degree college status of the college. This time, the college was affiliated to the newly established Agra University in 1927. Mr. Chatterji served the college as principal for 17 long years. During his tenure, he made a significant contribution to the development of the College. He introduced Hindi, Urdu and Political Science at the B.A. level and revived Postgraduate classes in Political Science and Mathematics. He organized a massive subscription drive to collect funds which he used to build a Pavilion and a tennis court on the college playground.

In 1931, Christ Church a men's College till then, opened its doors to women students. The College was by now a renowned institution and eminent luminaries who graced the college include Rev. Harcourt Butler and the members of the Calcutta University in 1918, Dinabandhu C.F. Andrews in 1927, Gurudev Rabindra Nath Tagore in 1928 and Pandit Jawahar Lal Nehru in 1929. Rev. J.T. Thorne was appointed the next Principal of Christ Church College in 1941. As it was war time, in October 1943 Rev. Thorne was required to serve as an Army Chaplain and had to resign. He was followed by Rev. R.G. Slater, who took over as Principal in 1943 and served the college for the next thirteen years. In 1944, Rev. Slater formed the Games Committee and was also instrumental in the formation of 'Old Boys Association'. To start with 218 old boys became life members.

In 1945, the S.P.G. mission transferred the College as a trust to the Lucknow Diocesan Trust Association. The first convocation of the college was held in 1946. Hon'ble Diwan Bahadur S.P. Singh, speaker of the Punjab Legislative Assembly, delivered the first Convocation Address on December 20th, 1946. Thereafter, the college continued to invite a galaxy of renowned dignitaries for its annual convocations. To widen the subjects taught in the curriculum, the College introduced

Sociology at both the Graduate and Post graduate level by 1950, becoming the first College in U. P. to do so. Subsequently Postgraduate classes were restarted in English in 1951 with Hindi being added in 1955 and Economics in 1956.

In 1947, the Kanpur University College Athletic Association was formed with Rev. Slater as its first president. This gave a boost to Inter-College games and tournaments. In 1948, the University Training Corps (formed in 1942) was transformed into the National Cadet Corps (NCC). The College unit of the Student Christian Movement (S.C.M.) had 34 members and had been conducting literacy classes very successfully for many years. Rev. Slater also carried out a massive construction and renovation programme, including two new Physics laboratories and four new tennis courts. The hostel's kitchens, dining rooms, staff and servant quarters were renovated and a massive jubilee block, currently housing the Zoology department was built. In 1956 the College "Union" was elected for the first time.

In December 1957, Mr. Ninan Abraham became the Principal. He worked indefatigably to develop the college infrastructure, adding classrooms, laboratories for Botany and Zoology, an auditorium and a separate building for the library. He used every grant available from the UGC and the Ministry of Education to the fullest. In 1961, the President of India, Dr. Sarvepalli Radhakrishnan inaugurated the auditorium and some classrooms.

The college affiliation was changed from Agra University to Kanpur University in 1966. In 1968, Rev. J. Amritanand, Bishop of Lucknow laid the foundation stone for the Library building, which when completed was formally inaugurated by Dr. B. Gopala Reddy, Governor of U.P. on December 16, 1970, on the occasion of the 24th Convocation held in the college. As the number of rooms increased, Mr. Abraham opened new courses in Science. B. Sc. Classes in Botany and Zoology were opened in 1960, M.Sc. Classes in Botany and Chemistry in 1961, while the M.Sc. Classes in Physics and Zoology started in 1970. Realizing that Commerce was becoming an attractive option for students, the college started B.Com classes in 1974, followed by M.Com classes in 1977.

A brief history of the church union movement leading to the formation of the Church of North India, which is at the helm of the College Management, would not be out of place. The drive for union between all branches of Christianity started as early as 1910 in the Conference of World Missionary Council at Edinburgh. The efforts of Bishop V.S. Ezariah, an Indian Bishop from Tinneveli in South India led to the foundation of the Church of South India (CSI) in 1947. The drive for a union in North India continued with the coming into existence of Pakistan in 1947. The branch of the Church of England in India began to be known as the Church of India, Pakistan, Burma & Ceylon (CIPBC). After many plans of negotiation, the agreement was reached and the Church of North India (CNI) was consecrated at the Nagpur Cathedral on 29th November, 1970. Six Churches which united to form the Church of North India were The Council of Baptist Churches in Northern India, the Church of the Brethren in India, the Disciples of Christ, the Church

of India (formerly called the Church of India, Pakistan, Burma and Ceylon), the Methodist Church (British and Australasian Conferences) and the United Church of North India. Organised into 26 Dioceses, of these the Lucknow Diocese was split in 1976 into two Dioceses, the Lucknow Diocese and the Agra Diocese (established on 9th April, 1976). The former contained all the Parishes South of the Ganges and the latter all the Parishes North of the Ganges. Since the formation of Agra Diocese, the Christ Church College is being managed by the Christ Church College Society. Its Governing Body comprises eminent members under the Chairmanship of the C.N.I. Bishop of Agra. The Rt. Revd. Ariel Victor Jonathan was the first Bishop of the newly formed CNI Diocese of Agra and the Chairman of the Governing Body of the College.

Dr. Y.B. Singh took charge as Principal in 1982. During his tenure, the student enrolment rose to 2,500, with 90 teachers and 86 students in the hostel. He introduced the "Orientation Program" for new students with emphasis on greater student - teacher interaction. The NCC and the NSS units were active in a variety of activities, including the National Adult Education Programme. The UGC and the All India Association of Christian Higher Education (AIACHE) sponsored a series of Seminars and workshops for Faculty Enrichment. The College SCM Unit hosted the UPSCM Conference. 7 SCM units attended it. Dr. Singh encouraged the Cultural Council to organize 'Talent' and 'Quest' programmes for the students of the College. Students participated in various Inter-College competitions, where they won laurels for themselves and honour for the college.

Dr. John Patterson, a brilliant Mathematics teacher in Christ Church College, after a brief stint in St. Andrew's College, Gorakhpur became the next Principal in July 1986. His term of office was a kaleidoscope of activities-academic, co-curricular, sports, vocational guidance and social justice. He built a new 'Centenary block' with many new classrooms using UGC grant. He also started the Institute for Vocational Studies (IVS). In 1995 a Women's Cell was set up with financial support from the AIACHE to promote gender sensitivity and women empowerment both for the girls of the college and for women in backward areas. The student enrolment rose gradually from 2,500 to 4000+. Scholarships worth more than Rs. 1, 75,000 were disbursed every year. The programme of Talent and Quest of College Cultural Council continued successfully till 1998, when the programme was christened Abhivyakti.

The Annual sports meet was held every year on the College playground and the students continued to distinguish themselves at all levels be it district, state or national, winning gold medals in a host of games and sports. The NCC (Air Wing and Armoured) and the NSS were popular with the students. Cadets were involved in programmes like Pulse Polio Immunization, massive tree plantation drives, collection of funds for the victims of the Bihar earthquake, taking part in a 120 km trekking event in Sikkim, a cycling expedition along the Ganga to make the locals aware of the dangers of polluting the river. In the changing scenario of education and keeping in view the aspirations and career preferences of the students, the Institute of Vocational Studies (IVS) was set up in 1988, for imparting Management and Journalism courses in association with Bhartiya Vidya

Bhawan, Mumbai. Through the Career Study Cell preparatory classes for civil services were organized for students of our college. In 2000, a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was signed with U. P. Rajarshi Tandon Open University to run a study centre in the premises of our College, to enable students of Kanpur city to take various courses under distance learning programme.

Dr. Pervez E. Deen a passionate Professor of English from St. John's College, Agra took over the charge of the College as Principal in July 2000, when Dr. Patterson retired. His tenure of fifteen years was very fruitful for the college as it made a straight climb to great heights of excellence. Some of the marked examples of his progressive vision and proactive work include the abolition of the student's union as his first step to improve the discipline and atmosphere of the College, formation of many new committees, particularly the Co-curricular Programmes Committee and initiation of many student-centric programmes, total renovation of the campus, classrooms, library, departments, playground etc., successful persuasion of departments to conduct national seminars and workshops, interactive staff programmes, initiation of a Career Guidance & Placement Cell and quick disposal of staff or students related matters through the office. He retired in 2015. Since then, the College is awaiting the appointment of a permanent Principal. The College was in the good hands of able officiating Principals, Dr. A. N. Tripathi, H.O.D. Commerce, (2015-16), Dr. Nita Dave Jain, H.O.D. English (2016-17) and Dr. R. K. Gupta, H.O.D. Commerce (2017-19).

In June 2019, Rev. Samuel Paul Lal was appointed Secretary of the College Governing Body. Having been the Presbyterian In-charge of Christ Church and the Secretary of management of Christ Church Inter College, Rev. S.P. Lal has both, the experience and expertise to take up this challenging assignment. A zealous man of God, he has spared no efforts in giving the College a new lease of life, both by his motivational exhortations and his proactive approach. Dr. Samuel Dayal, H.O.D. Economics, a veteran NSS Coordinator & Faculty coordinator, S.C.M (Students Christian Movement) was appointed the Officiating Principal for the session 2019-20. The teaching faculty, the office staff and the support staff work in synergy to fulfil the aims and vision of the founders of this illustrious institution.


Meeting of College Governing Body

When Albert Einstein Met Rabindra Nath Tagore: A Remarkable Meeting of Minds on the Edge of Science and Spirituality

On July 14, 1930, Albert Einstein welcomed into his home on the outskirts of Berlin the Indian philosopher, musician, and Nobel laureate Rabindranath Tagore. The two proceeded to have one of the most stimulating, intellectually riveting conversations in history, exploring the age-old friction between science and religion. This meeting was the historic encounter, amidst a broader discussion of the intellectual renaissance that swept India in the early twentieth century, germinating a curious osmosis of Indian traditions and secular Western scientific doctrine.



The following excerpt from one of Einstein and Tagore's conversations dances between previously examined definitions of science, beauty, consciousness, and philosophy in a masterful meditation on the most fundamental questions of human existence.

EINSTEIN: Do you believe in the Divine as isolated from the world?

TAGORE: Not isolated. The infinite personality of Man comprehends the Universe. There cannot be anything that cannot be subsumed by the human personality, and this proves that the Truth of the Universe is human Truth.

I have taken a scientific fact to explain this — Matter is composed of protons and electrons, with gaps between them; but matter may seem to be solid. Similarly humanity is composed of individuals, yet they have their interconnection of human relationship, which gives living unity to man's world. The entire universe is linked up with us in a similar manner, it is a human universe. I have pursued this thought through art, literature and the religious consciousness of man.

EINSTEIN: There are two different conceptions about the nature of the universe: (1) The world as a unity dependent on humanity. (2) The world as a reality independent of the human factor.

TAGORE: When our universe is in harmony with Man, the eternal, we know it as Truth, we

feel it as beauty.

EINSTEIN: This is the purely human conception of the universe.

TAGORE: There can be no other conception. This world is a human world — the scientific view of it is also that of the scientific man. There is some standard of reason and enjoyment which gives it Truth, the standard of the Eternal Man whose experiences are through our experiences.

EINSTEIN: This is a realization of the human entity.

TAGORE: Yes, one eternal entity. We have to realize it through our emotions and activities. We realized the Supreme Man who has no individual limitations through our limitations. Science is concerned with that which is not confined to individuals; it is the impersonal human world of Truths. Religion realizes these Truths and links them up with our deeper needs; our individual consciousness of Truth gains universal significance. Religion applies values to Truth, and we know this Truth as good through our own harmony with it.

EINSTEIN: Truth, then, or Beauty is not independent of Man?

TAGORE: No.

EINSTEIN: If there would be no human beings any more, the Apollo of Belvedere would no longer be beautiful.

TAGORE: No.

EINSTEIN: I agree with regard to this conception of Beauty, but not with regard to Truth.

TAGORE: Why not? Truth is realized through man.

EINSTEIN: I cannot prove that my conception is right, but that is my religion.

TAGORE: Beauty is in the ideal of perfect harmony which is in the Universal Being; Truth the perfect comprehension of the Universal Mind. We individuals approach it through our own mistakes and blunders, through our accumulated experiences, through our illumined consciousness — how, otherwise, can we know Truth?

EINSTEIN: I cannot prove scientifically that Truth must be conceived as a Truth that is valid independent of humanity; but I believe it firmly. I believe, for instance, that the Pythagorean theorem in geometry states something that is approximately true, independent of the existence of man. Anyway, if there is a reality independent of man, there is also a Truth relative to this reality; and in the same way the negation of the first engenders a negation of the existence of the latter.

TAGORE: Truth, which is one with the Universal Being, must essentially be human, otherwise whatever we individuals realize as true can never be called truth – at least the Truth which is described as scientific and which only can be reached through the process of logic, in other words, by an organ of thoughts which is human. According to Indian Philosophy there is Brahman, the absolute Truth, which cannot be conceived by the isolation of the individual mind or described by words but can only be realized by completely merging the individual in its infinity. But such a Truth cannot belong to Science. The nature of Truth which we are discussing is an appearance – that is to say,

what appears to be true to the human mind and therefore is human, and may be called maya or illusion.

EINSTEIN: So according to your conception, which may be the Indian conception, it is not the illusion of the individual, but of humanity as a whole.

TAGORE: The species also belongs to a unity, to humanity. Therefore the entire human mind realizes Truth; the Indian or the European mind meet in a common realization.

EINSTEIN: The word species is used in German for all human beings, as a matter of fact, even the apes and the frogs would belong to it.

TAGORE: In science we go through the discipline of eliminating the personal limitations of our individual minds and thus reach that comprehension of Truth which is in the mind of the Universal Man.

EINSTEIN: The problem begins whether Truth is independent of our consciousness. TAGORE: What we call truth lies in the rational harmony between the subjective and objective aspects of reality, both of which belong to the super-personal man.

EINSTEIN: Even in our everyday life we feel compelled to ascribe a reality independent of man to the objects we use. We do this to connect the experiences of our senses in a reasonable way. For instance, if nobody is in this house, yet that table remains where it is.

TAGORE: Yes, it remains outside the individual mind, but not the universal mind. The table which I perceive is perceptible by the same kind of consciousness which I possess.

EINSTEIN: If nobody would be in the house the table would exist all the same — but this is already illegitimate from your point of view — because we cannot explain what it means that the table is there, independently of us.

Our natural point of view in regard to the existence of truth apart from humanity cannot be explained or proved, but it is a belief which nobody can lack — no primitive beings even. We attribute to Truth a super-human objectivity; it is indispensable for us, this reality which is independent of our existence and our experience and our mind — though we cannot say what it means.

TAGORE: Science has proved that the table as a solid object is an appearance and therefore that which the human mind perceives as a table would not exist if that mind were naught. At the same time it must be admitted that the fact, that the ultimate physical reality is nothing but a multitude of separate revolving centres of electric force, also belongs to the human mind. In the apprehension of Truth there is an eternal conflict between the universal human mind and the same mind confined in the individual. The perpetual process of reconciliation is being carried on in our science, philosophy, in our ethics. In any case, if there be any Truth absolutely unrelated to humanity then for us it is absolutely non-existing.

It is not difficult to imagine a mind to which the sequence of things happens not in space but only in time like the sequence of notes in music. For such a mind such conception of reality is akin to the musical reality in which Pythagorean geometry can have no meaning. There is the reality of paper, infinitely different from the reality of literature. For the kind of mind possessed by the moth which eats that paper literature is absolutely non-existent, yet for Man's mind literature has a greater value of Truth than the paper itself. In a similar manner if there be some Truth which has no sensuous or rational relation to the human mind, it will ever remain as nothing so long as we remain human beings.

EINSTEIN: Then I am more religious than you are!

TAGORE: My religion is in the reconciliation of the Super-personal Man, the universal human spirit, in my own individual being.

Together, a bridge they build, betwixt the individual and society,


Creating a balance between the deified and the deity!

Be a Friend and Love your Pet

Recently, there was a news in the paper that a dog was shot dead by the robbers while he was trying to save his master from them. The news reminded me of several Bollywood stories, where pets particularly 'dogs' showed exemplary courage, devotion and loyalty towards their masters and even laid down their lives for them. I have always been thinking about this beautiful relationship between humans and animals, particularly between humans and dogs. Animals are not able to express themselves through our kind of language. They certainly have very strong communication and expression skills. There is something which connects and develops a mutual relationship of love, faith and belongingness. This relationship becomes so strong that our loving dog does not think twice even before sacrificing life for his loved one. The same might not be true vice -versa. Humans are more calculative and possessive about themselves. Their relationship with their loving dog is generally based on calculations and cost- benefit ratio. There are examples when they have even killed their own dogs and pets, as and when they have feel that these pets have become a liability for them.

Here, I would like to focus on the fact that dogs are our real friends in need. I do not begin my day, unless my dear cute dog comes to wish me Good Morning in his own style. Sometimes I think, what he expects from me in return and why does he love me so much. Some may scientifically analyze that animal are in need of food and they love me because I feed them. Is it so? If it is true then why does not he even look at food when I am not around and prefers to keep fast till I come back? Still I may not be able to explain it a loving relationship, because I am a human being and trying to interpret from human perspective. If I look at the relationship from my dog's perspective, the picture might be different. My dog would say "I don't want anything, but only your love and affection and I will sacrifice anything for you in return. You may keep me in a palace or on the street, you may offer me the choicest of food or even just two pieces of bread, that doesn't matter, but once you have bestowed upon me that love and affection, I will be yours forever. Once, I develop that confidence and trust in you, I will be yours and for you whatsoever may happen. Even if you kick me out; I will keep lying on your doorsteps and keep protecting you. Friends, I feel that this is the perfect 'Romantic Relationship' and repersents eternal friendship. Philosophers explain that dogs have "unsplit Single Personality". They are governed by emotions and not by reason.

Now from the rational- scientific and human perspectives also, it has been proven that our pets are beneficial to us in keeping us happy and healthy. A study of ten months, conducted at Cambridge University found that pet owners were healthier than others. Stroking a pet, watching them playing or simply watching a fish swimming in an aquarium helps us to relax. Indeed the mere presence of a pet seems to have the same effect, reducing heart beat rate and lowering blood pressure. Researches have shown that this effect is particularly marked in people suffering from High BP. The reduction in blood pressure is equivalent to that gained by eating a low salt diet or cutting down on alcohol consumption. Heart disease is one of the

biggest killers today, yet it is also an area where pets come to our rescue. One study has shown that keeping a pet, significantly reduced level of Cholesterol and blood triglyceride. An American Study has shown that patients who owned a pet had a better chance of surviving after a heart attack.

Pets do offer a psychological and social boost to our lives. Children who own a pet are often less self-centered than those who do not. Caring for dog gives them happiness and helps in developing a caring attitude in them. Pets provide companionship and promote a general feeling of wellbeing. They lessen the feeling of isolation and loneliness, providing a sense of purpose to the elderly and lonely persons.

Pets are also being described as a Social Lubricant. Several studies have shown that people walking with a dog in the park or street have more positive encounters with others than those walking alone. Pets become a point of starting a conversation.

Pets do teach us a lot like sense of responsibility, mutual trust. By feeding and exercising a pet, children develop an understanding of daily care. Children with learning difficulties can also benefit from interacting with pets. One recent study has found that the presence of a dog helped to channel the children's attention and responsiveness towards therapist's suggestion. In effect, the dog helped in increasing the attention span of the children.

Giving the above scientific and rational justification, takes me back to that self-centered human logic: "why should I love my dog", "what are the advantages and disadvantages in keeping this relationship". I am sure the above cost benefit analysis might answer their query. Here I am reminded of a story told at the very end of Mahabharta, where Pandav Brothers and their wife Draupadi after renouncing their kingdom, retired from the world begun to walk up into the Himalayas- towards Heaven itself, accompanied by their loyal and helpful dog. One by one, they begin to weaken and die; finally, only Yudhishthira, the son of Dharma himself and the dog were left. These two arrive at gates of Heaven, where Lord Indra was present to greet Yudhishthira, Yudhishthira begins to enter the heaven and the dog followed. Indra objected and said "Yudhishthira, this dog is not eligible and qualified to enter the Heaven. You must leave him behind, A dog is not allowed in Heaven. Yudhishthira replied, "This dog has been a loyal and true companion. He has stood by me through this long journey. It is not a good thing to just leave him. I will not abandon him."

Philosophy and Human Enterprise

"The unexamined life is not worth living" - Socrates

Philosophy is quite unlike any other field. It is unique both in its methods and in the nature and breadth of its subject matter. Philosophy pursues questions in every dimension of human life, and its techniques apply to problems in any field of study or endeavor. No brief definition expresses its richness and variety of philosophy. It may be described in many ways. It is a reasoned pursuit of fundamental truths, a quest for understanding, a study of principles of conduct. It seeks to establish standards of evidence, to provide rational methods of resolving conflicts, and to create techniques for evaluating ideas and arguments. Philosophy develops the capacity to see the world from the perspectives of other individuals and other cultures; it enhances one's ability to perceive the relationships among the various fields of study; and it deepens one's sense of the meaning and variety of human experience.

This short description of philosophy could be greatly expanded, but let us instead illustrate some of the points. As the systematic study of ideas and issues, philosophy may examine concepts and views drawn from science, art, religion, politics or any other realm. Philosophical appraisal of ideas and issues takes many forms, but philosophical studies often focus on the meaning of an idea and on its basis, coherence, and relations to other ideas. Consider, for instance, democracy. What is it? What justifies it as a system of government? Consider human knowledge. What is its nature and extent? Must we always have evidence in order to know? What can we know about the thoughts and feelings of others, or about the future? What kind of knowledge, if any, is fundamental? Similar kinds of questions arise concerning art, morality, religion, science, and each of the major human activity. Philosophy explores all of them. It views them both microscopically and from the wide perspective of the larger concerns of human existence.

Many branches have grown from the traditional core areas like, for instance, philosophy of mind, philosophy of religion, philosophy of science, political philosophy, social philosophy, philosophy of law, philosophy of language, and philosophy of art and so on. It is in the nature of philosophy as a critical inquiry to develop new subfields when new directions in the quest for knowledge, or in any other area of human activity,

raises new intellectual problems. Much of what is learned in philosophy can be applied in virtually any endeavor. This is both because philosophy touches on so many subjects and, especially because many of its methods are usable in any field.

Philosophy is the systematic study of ideas and issues, a reasoned pursuit of fundamental truths, a guest for comprehensive understanding of the world, a study of principles of conduct, and much more. Every domain of human experience raises questions to which its techniques and theories apply, and its methods may be used in the study of any subject or the pursuit of any vocation. Indeed, philosophy is in a sense inescapable: life confronts every thoughtful person with some philosophical questions, and nearly everyone is guided by philosophical assumptions, even if unconsciously. To a large extent one can choose how reflective one will be in clarifying and developing one's philosophical assumptions, and how well prepared one is for the philosophical questions life presents. Philosophical training enhances our problem solving capacities, our abilities to understand and express ideas, and our persuasive powers. It also develops understanding and enjoyment of things whose absence impoverishes many lives: such things as aesthetic experience, communication with many different kinds of people, lively discussion of current issues, the discerning observation of human behavior, and intellectual zest. In these and other ways the study of philosophy contributes immeasurably in both academic and other pursuits.

The problem solving, analytical, judgmental, and synthesizing capacities philosophy develops are unrestricted in their scope and unlimited in their usefulness. This makes philosophy especially good preparation for positions of leadership, responsibility or management. The undergraduate or post graduate in philosophy can easily be integrated with requirements for nearly any entry level job; but philosophical training, particularly in its development of many transferable skills, is especially significant for its long term benefits in career advancement.

Wisdom, leadership, and the capacity to resolve human conflicts cannot be guaranteed by any course of study; but philosophy has traditionally pursued these ideals systematically, and its methods, its literature, and its ideas are of constant use in the quest to realize them. Sound reasoning, critical thinking, well constructed prose, maturity of judgment, a strong sense of relevance, and an enlightened consciousness are never obsolete, nor are they subject to the fluctuating demands of the market-place. The study of philosophy is the most direct route, and in many cases, the only route to the full development of these qualities.

वर्ष 1971 में मैं कक्षा आठ का विद्यार्थी था। मिशन कालेज के तत्कालीन प्रधानाचार्य स्व0 जेम्स सेथ मोरार नैतिक शिक्षा की कक्षा में एक विद्यार्थी के विकास के चार आयामों की चर्चा किए। नैतिक शिक्षा से सम्बन्धित उनके द्वारा दिए गए अनेक व्याख्यान मुझे आज तक स्मरणीय हैं। किसी विद्यार्थी की चार दिशाओं में उन्नित होनी चाहिये यह विचार मेरे विद्यार्थी जीवन का आधार बन गया। मैंने अपने जीवन का निर्माण विद्यार्थी के चतुर्दिक विकास मॉडल के आधार पर होने का सम्पूर्ण प्रयास किया। मुझे यह सौभाग्य प्राप्त हुआ कि 1987 में मैं क्राइस्ट चर्च कॉलेज में अर्थशास्त्र विभाग में अध्यापक के रूप में नियुक्त हो गया। कक्षा में अपने विद्यार्थियों को पढ़ाते समय मेरे मित्तिष्क में सदैव यह मॉडल बना रहता। 1990 में मुझे राष्ट्रीय सेवा योजना का कार्यक्रम अधिकारी नियुक्त किया गया। मुझे इस मॉडल को विद्यर्थियों के जीवन में गहराई से उतारने को सैद्धांतिक एवं व्यवहारिक दोनों प्रकार का अवसर प्राप्त हो गया। इस प्रकार जहाँ एक तरफ अर्थशास्त्र विषय के आर्थिक विकास के व्यवहारिक पक्ष पर प्रकाश डालना मेरा शैक्षणिक कार्य था वहीं दूसरी तरफ राष्ट्रीय सेवा योजना के विद्यार्थियों का चतुर्दिक विकास हो सके यह मेरी नैतिक जिम्मेदारी थी। इस मॉडल को मुझे प्रस्तुत करने का अवसर अनेक विद्यार्थियों एवं विश्वविद्यालयों में प्राप्त हुआ। संक्षेप में इस मॉडल की व्याख्या प्रस्तुत है:

यह मॉडल बाइबिल से उद्धृत एक वाक्य पर आधारित है जो निम्न है

"यीशु बुद्धि और डील–डौल में, और परमेश्वर और मनुष्यों के अनुग्रह में बढ़ता गया!"

(Jesus become wise and the grew strong, God was pleased with him and were the people) Bible (Luke) 2:52 मेरे मिशन कॉलेज के प्रधानाचार्य स्व0 मोरार ने इस वाक्य को विश्लेषित करके बताया कि इसमें एक बालक (विद्यार्थी) का चार दिशाओं में विकास (उन्नति) होना वर्णित है—

- 01. बौद्धिक विकास (Mental Growth)
- 02. शारीरिक विकास (Physical Growth)
- 03. आध्यात्मिक विकास (Spiritual Growth)
- 04. सामाजिक विकास (Social Growth)

उपर्युक्त वर्णित समस्त विकास की उन्नित बालक यीशु में पायी गयीं । उन्होंने अपने शिक्षकों तथा तत्कालीन उपलब्ध ग्रंथों को स्वयं पढ़कर ज्ञान अर्जित किया । उनका एक बार सामना कुछ धर्म गुरुओं से हुआ । वे उनसे शास्त्रार्थ कर रहे थे । अंत में उन धर्म गुरुओं ने क्राइस्ट के सन्दर्भ में कहा इस (बालक) को इतना ज्ञान कहाँ से प्राप्त हुआ? पर कथन हमारे लिए भी सिद्ध हो सकता है। मैं सदैव से यह कहता रहा हूँ कि विद्यार्थी जीवन स्वर्णिम काल (Golden Period) होता है। उच्च शिक्षा प्राप्त होना अधिकार नहीं वरन् सौभाग्य है । हाई स्कूल में मेरी कक्षा में लगभग 60 विद्यार्थी थे। जहाँ तक मुझे स्मरण है उनमें से मात्र 9 विद्यार्थी ही उच्च शिक्षा प्राप्त कर सके। मैं व्यक्तिगत तौर पर अनेक ऐसे लोगों को जानता हूँ जो अपना अध्ययन जारी ना रख सके। अतः उच्च शिक्षा प्राप्त करने के अवसर को हाथ से न जानें दें। स्मरण रखें कि उच्च शिक्षा प्राप्त करने के लिए कोई छोटा रास्ता नहीं है। आसान रास्ता अपनाने से लाभ अल्प मात्रा में एवं अल्प काल के लिए मिलेगा। मुझे इलाहाबाद

विश्वविद्यालय में अध्ययन करने का अवसर प्राप्त हुआ था। वहां एक सामान्य स्लोगन था – "Sixteen hours a day" अर्थात् 24 घण्टे से 16 घंटे अध्ययन के लिए देना चाहिए। मैं छात्रावास में रहता था, जहाँ लगभग सभी विद्यार्थी वास्तव में इस लोकोक्ति को चरितार्थ करते थे। मैं भी उनमें जुड़ गया था। वैश्वीकरण के इस युग में अधिक प्रबुद्ध परिश्रमी विद्यार्थी ही आगे 🕻 निकल सकेगा। पोस्ट – ग्रेजुएशन करने के दौरान हॉस्टल में अपने कमरे में अपनी अध्ययन मेज के सामने एक वाक्य लिखकर चिपकाया था – "दूर दृष्टि, कड़ी मेहनत, पक्का इरादा"। समय प्रबंधन करना अत्यंत महत्वपूर्ण है। मोबाइल फोन पर आवश्यकता से अधिक समय व्यतीत करना अथवा व्यर्थ में इधर-उधर घूमने जाना इत्यादि हमे वर्तमान में थोड़ा आनंद अवश्य देगा किन्तु हमारे अध्ययन को बड़े पैमाने पर बाधित करेगा। स्मरण रखें सिर्फ एक बार हमें विद्यालय में अध्ययन करने के लिए सुअवसर मिला है । शीघ्र ही यह समाप्त हो जायेगा – अतः जो कुछ भी अपने अध्ययन काल में करेंगे वही दीर्घकालीन प्रतिफल निर्धारित करेगा। 15 – 25 वर्ष तक उच्च शिक्षा प्राप्त करने का समय रहता है। इस काल में विद्यार्थी को कम से कम 12 घंटे प्रतिदिन अध्ययन में अवश्य व्यतीत करना चाहिए। अध्ययन हेत् पर्याप्त पुस्तकें अवश्य खरीदनी चाहिए। भारतवर्ष में उच्च शिक्षा का माध्यम अंग्रेजी भाषा अभी तक बना हुआ है। दूसरे शब्दों में राष्ट्रीय एवं अन्तर्राष्ट्रीय स्तर पर प्रकाशित पुस्तकें अंग्रेजी भाषा में ही अधिकतर उपलब्ध हैं। हिन्दी भाषाभाषी विद्यार्थी ऐसी पुस्तकों को पुस्तकालय से प्राप्त करके आवश्यकतानुसार अध्ययन करें। विषय विशेष से संबंधित पुस्तकों के अतिरिक्त पत्रिकाएं एवं जर्नल्स भी पढ़ना आवश्यक होता है, उदाहरणस्वरूप 'योजना' पत्रिका भारत सरकार के प्रकाशन मंत्रालय द्वारा भारत की 12 भाषाओं में प्रकाशित होती है। विषय विशेष के ज्ञान के साथ सामान्य ज्ञान, सामान्य अंग्रेजी / हिन्दी एवं कम्प्यूटर का ज्ञान अति आवश्यक है, यह विषय विशाल है। शेष अपने विषय अध्यापक से निकट संपर्क बनाये रखना दिशा निर्देश हेत् अत्यन्त आवश्यक शर्त है।

शारीरिक विकास (Physical Growth): एक कथन है कि स्वस्थ शरीर में ही स्वस्थ मस्तिष्क पोषित होता है। एक बालक के स्वास्थ्य के लिए माता पिता पर्याप्त रूप से सचेत होते हैं। उपलब्ध संसाधनों के आधार पर अभिभावक आवश्यक पौष्टिक भोजन प्रदान करने का प्रयास करते हैं। घर में बने भोजन को अमृत समझें एवं बाहरी चटपटेदार भोजन से परहेज़ करें। समय—समय पर अपने माता पिता को इसके लिए धन्यवाद दें। धूम्रपान एवं नशीली वस्तुओं का प्रयोग सामान्यतः अधिक उम्र पर पहुँचने पर जवान लोग करने लगते हैं। इसके प्रयोग को तनाव से मुक्ति करने का एक साधन समझते हैं। क्षणिक समय के लिए यह सही भी हो किन्तु इसका प्रभाव कई गुना अधिक नुकसान दायक होता है। मुँह एवं फेफड़े का कैंसर, गुर्दे एवं किडनी का खराब हो जाना इत्यादि उदाहरण हैं। सामान्य तौर पर समाज में इसे स्वीकार नहीं किया जाता है। इसके साथ कीमती पैसों की बर्बादी निंदनीय है। इसे बचाकर जरूरत—मंद लोगों की सहायता करना एक उच्च सामाजिक जिम्मेदारी का परिचायक होगा।

उचित आहार ग्रहण करने की विचारधारा के पश्चात् आराम करने अर्थात सोने की आवश्यकता पर पर्याप्त ध्यान दिया जाना चाहिए। भारत के प्रथम प्रधानमंत्री पं0 जवाहर लाल नेहरू का कथन था "Sleeping five hours is necessary, sleeping six hours is luxury, sleeping seven hours is waste".

मैंने इस नियम को स्वीकार कर लिया था। यद्यपि चिकित्सा विज्ञान 7 — 8 घंटे सोने का अनुमोदन करता है। अतः 16 — 25

आयु के वर्ग के विद्यार्थियों को 6 – 7 घंटे अवश्य सोना चाहिए किन्तु इससे अधिक नहीं। समय प्रबंधन सीखना अति आवश्यक है। अपने स्वास्थ्य को बेहतर रखने के लिए उचित समय पर सोना, उचित समय पर उठना एवं उचित समय तक सोना इत्यादि इसके अंतर्गत सीखना है। Christ grew physically also.

अाध्यात्मिक विकास (Spiritual Growth): जैसा कि लेख के प्रारम्भ में एक वाक्य उद्धृत है: बालक यीशु आत्मिक अर्थात् परमेश्वर के अनुग्रह में पूर्ण—रूपेण बढ़े। हम सभी परमेश्वर में विश्वास रखते है, और रखना चाहिए। परमेश्वर सृजनहार, पालनहार और तारणहार हैं। परमेश्वर का ध्यान करना उनके बारे में चर्चा करना, लोगों एवं पुस्तकों से जानकारी प्राप्त करना, ईश्वरीय विचार रखने वाले लोगों की संगति में जाना इत्यादि हम पर परमेश्वर की इच्छा को प्रकट करेगा। परमेश्वर के सन्दर्भ में बाइबिल में एक उदाहरण है — तू प्रभू अपने परमेश्वर से अपने सम्पूर्ण मन, सम्पूर्ण प्राण, सम्पूर्ण भाक्ति एवं सम्पूर्ण बुद्धि से प्रेम रख। परमेश्वर ने हम मनुष्यों के लिए एक नियमावली प्रदान की है जो भले बुरे के ज्ञान से सम्बन्धित है। ईश्वर—प्रदत्त हमारा विवेक सदैव इसके लिए निर्देशन देता रहता है। किन्तु यदि हम अपने विवेक की न सुनकर बार—बार विरोधी निर्णय लेकर कार्यों को करते हैं तो एक समय विवेक मृतक हो जायेगा और निर्देशन देना बंद कर देगा। परमेश्वर से प्रार्थना करना है कि वह अपने पवित्र—आत्मा से हमारे विवेक को पोषित करे और हम उसके निर्देशों के अनुसार व्यवहार करें, कार्य करें। स्मरण रखें यह अत्यंत त्यागमय प्रक्रिया है, और कभी—कभी कष्टमय भी होती है। उदाहरणस्वरूप—परीक्षा में नकल न करना। नकल करने से हो सकता है कि कुछ अधिक अंक मिल जायें, किन्तु यह मान्य नहीं है। जागृत विवेक इसकी अनुमति नहीं देगा। परमेश्वर से सदैव प्रार्थना करते रहें कि वह आपको पर्याप्त बुद्धि प्रदान करे और प्रत्येक समय आपकी सहायता करे।

सामाजिक विकास (Social Growth): 1992 में मुझे राष्ट्रीय सेवा योजना का कार्यक्रम अधिकारी नियुक्त किया गया था। एन०एस०एस० का मुख्य वाक्य था — 'मैं नहीं तुम' अर्थात् दूसरों के प्रति हमारा उत्तरदायित्व । मुझे पर्याप्त अवसर प्राप्त होने लगे कि एन०एन०एस० विद्यार्थियों जिनकी संख्या 100 होती थी उनमें समाज—सेवा की भावना को दृढ़ कर सकूँ। दूसरों की सेवा—सहायता करना विशेष रूप से मेरी माता के द्वारा मुझे जीवन के प्रारंभिक दिनों में सिखाया गया। विद्यालय में अपने अध्यापन के दौरान विशेषकर एन०एस०एस० विद्यार्थियों में देश—प्रेम, समाज—सेवा एवं आपसी भाई—चारे के महत्वपूर्ण सिद्धांतों को सिखाने के अनेक अवसर प्राप्त हुए। Socially Christ grew in the favour of men, क्राइस्ट अपने समय के लोगों के साथ मित्रवत एवं सहायक थे। वास्तव में प्रत्येक विद्यार्थी के महत्वपूर्ण लक्ष्यों में से यह एक महत्वपूर्ण लक्ष्य है।

परम-पिता परमेश्वर से प्रार्थना है कि वे क्राइस्ट चर्च महाविद्यालय के समस्त विद्यार्थियों को आशीष दें, कि उनका चतुर्दिक विकास हो सके, जिससे वे स्वयं में पूर्ण सफलता प्राप्त करें एवं देश के विश्वास योग्य नागरिक सिद्ध हो सकें तब हम विश्वास के साथ गुनगुना सकेगें-

We shall overcome some day.



दलितों का राजनीतिकरण

'समाज में दिलतों के साथ जो अमानवीय व्यवहार हुआ है, उसे भुलाया नहीं जा सकता। समाज तो दोषी हैं ही, सबसे बड़ा दोष उस वर्ण—व्यवस्था का है, जो शूद्रों को शूद्र बने रहने के लिए बाध्य करती है। दिलतों को अछूत माना गया। यह विडंबना ही है कि किसी मनुष्य को छूने मात्र से कोई कैसे अपवित्र हो जाता है।

वर्ण व्यवस्था देते समय आर्यों ने यह नहीं समझा था कि समय बीतने पर आगे चलकर कुछ काल पश्चात् चारों वर्णों में इतना अधिक अंतर पड़ने लगेगा कि एक दूसरे को हेय दृष्टि से देखेगा या एक दूसरे को नीच समझने लगेगा अथवा एक दूसरे का शोषण कर सकेगा। विभिन्न कार्यों में दक्षता बढ़ने—बढ़ाने और अपने—अपने कार्यों को समर्पण की भावना से करने के विचार से ही वर्ण—व्यवस्था की रूपरेखा तैयार की गई थी। वर्ण—व्यवस्था आर्यों के समय की समाज और देश हित की दृष्टि से असाधारण मस्तिष्क की ही उपज मानी जाती है, परंतु हर व्यवस्था में जैसे कुछ काल बीतने पर अधिकाधिक दोष भी आ जाते हैं, वही उसके साथ भी हुआ।

एक तो देश की बहुसंख्यक जनता प्राचीनकाल से समाज की कुरीतियों से अभिशप्त हो प्रताड़ित हो रही थी, दूसरे विदेशियों ने समूचे देश की जनता को तबाह कर देने की नीति अपना रखी थी। उनकी कूटनीति थी कि पूरे देश को गरीबी की इतनी गहरी गर्त में गिरा दिया जाए कि इस देश की जनता को उनकी तरफ आंख उठाकर देखने का मौका न मिल सके। यहीं तक सीमित नहीं था हमारी भाषा, सभ्यता, संस्कृति और रहन—सहन के स्तर को इतना अधिक गिरा दिया गया था कि हम सब प्रकार से अन्यमुखापेक्षी हो गए। अपनी उस नीति में वह सफल भी हो गए जिसका फल यह हुआ कि हममें आत्मनिर्भरता की भावना का लोप हो गया और हम हर वस्तु के लिए उनकी बाट जोहने लग गए।

स्वतंत्रता संग्राम के समय विभिन्न मतों, धर्मों, संप्रदायों, जातियों, उप जातियों और वर्गों ने एक होकर निःस्वार्थ भाव से देश को स्वत्रंत कराने के लिए संघर्ष किया था । परंतु ज्यों ही देश में जनतंत्र की कुछ झलक मिलने लगी कि फूट का बीज अंकुरित होने लगा और देश विखंडित हो गया। देश जब स्वतंत्र हुआ तो जिनके हाथों में देश की बागडोर पहले—पहल आई उन्होंने देश की समस्त जनता के उत्थान की पूत भावना को भुला कर अपनी कुर्सी बचाने की रणनीति अपनानी शुरू की। उन्होंने सोचा यदि बहुसंख्यक दिलतों और अल्पसंख्यकों के वोट बैंक को प्रभावित कर लिया जाए तो उनकी कुर्सी कभी हिल नहीं सकती।

एक तरफ दिलतों की दशा खराब थी ही, दूसरी तरफ सवर्णों में ऐसे लोगों की दशा उनसे कम शोचनीय नहीं थी जिनके पास कृषि योग्य भूमि कम थी और वे अपने हाथ काम न कर उसके लिए मज़दूरों को लगाते थे। उनमें उन लोगों का दोष नहीं था। समाज की ख़ामियों के कारण वे मजबूर थे। गरीब से गरीब सवर्ण अपमान और बेइज्जती के भय से हल नहीं चला सकता था। उसके पास खेती के अतिरिक्त अन्य धंधा भी नहीं था।

भारत गाँव एवं किसान बहुल देश है। अस्सी प्रतिशत जनता गाँवों में ही निवास करती है। किसानों की आर्थिक दशा से सारा देश परिचित है। उनकी दशा आज भी शोचनीय बनी हुई है। परतंत्र भारत में दिलतों के साथ ग़ैर—दिलत भी सताए गए हैं चाहे वह विदेशियों के हाथों अथवा ज़मीदारों, तालुकदारों या राजरियासतों द्वारा।

गैर दिलतों में कुछ की दशा तो दिलतों से भी बदतर है क्योंकि वे भूखों मर रहे हैं, फिर भी जातीय बंधन के कारण प्रतिष्ठा बचाने के लिए दूसरों के यहाँ मजदूरी नहीं कर सकते। यही कारण है कि कुरीतियों में उलझकर इन दिनों भी कितने सवर्ण कहीं दिलतों के समान ही गरीब हैं और कहीं उनसे भी गरीब होकर गरीबी रेखा के नीचे जीवनयापन कर रहे हैं। दूसरी तरफ जब दिलतों पर नज़र डालते हैं तो पाते हैं कि पूर्व में भी दिलत दूसरों की मजदूरी करके अपने और अपने परिवार को भूखों नहीं मरने देता था। उनका संपूर्ण परिवार दूसरों की मजदूरी करके आसानी से अपना जीवन बसर कर लेता था। परंतु वहीं यह भी सच है कि दिलतों में भी अधिकांश मजदूरी से अपने और अपने परिवार का मात्र पेट भर सकते हैं। अन्यान्य कार्यों के लिए तो उन्हें दूसरों का कर्ज़दार होना पड़ता है जिससे उनकी गरीबी परछाईं की भांति उनका साथ कभी छोड़ती नजर नहीं आती।

यही वक्त है जब सरकार की नीतियों का गंभीर विश्लेषण किया जाए और उसके वैकल्पिक और पूरक तरीके ढूँढ़े जाएँ। आरक्षण की अपनी उपलब्धियाँ हैं, लेकिन उसकी गंभीर ख़ामियाँ भी हैं, और निश्चय ही बराबरी लाने का वह एकमात्र तरीका तो नहीं है। यह हमारे समाज का बौद्धिक आलस्य और राजनैतिक कूपमंडूकता ही है की वह आरक्षण के समर्थन या विरोध के परे नहीं देख सकता।

सरकार की गलत नीतियों के ही कारण किसान कृषि से हैरान होकर गाँवों को छोड़ शहरों की ओर भाग रहे हैं। एक तरफ आरक्षण के कारण देश से प्रतिभा पलायन हो रही है और दूसरी तरफ किसानों का गाँव की ओर से शहरों की ओर पलायन हुआ तो वह दिन दूर नहीं जब जगतगुरू कहलाने वाला देश इस राष्ट्र की राष्ट्रीय सरकार की अविवेकपूर्ण नीतियों के ही कारण रसातल को पहुँच जाएगा।

वास्तव में आरक्षण इस समय असंतोष एवं विक्षोभ उत्पन्न करने की भूमिका में पहुँच चुका है। देश के प्रबुद्ध जन तो उसे लागू करने के तौर तरीक़ों का विरोध कर ही रहे हैं। वर्तमान सरकार के मंत्री तक उसका विरोध करने से नहीं चूक रहे हैं। हमारे संविधान के निर्माताओं ने समाज में सदियों से दबे—कुचले लोगों को बराबरी का अवसर प्रदान करने के उद्देश्य से आरक्षण का प्रावधान रखा था। आरक्षण को चुनाव जीतने का औज़ार बनाने की बात उनकी कल्पना से परे रही होगी क्योंकि कोई व्यवस्था तभी तक निर्विवाद रूप से चल सकती है, जब तक उसका दुरुपयोग नहीं किया जाता और न वह देश हित के विरुद्ध होती।





Green Polymers: Synthesis and Applications

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Renewable or synthetic starting materials may be used to produce biodegradable polymer. Modification of a naturally occurring polymer to give it the desired properties (but the biodegradability of the polymer may be adversely affected). For Green polymer synthesis the input materials for the production of these polymers may be either renewable (based on agricultural plant or animal products) or synthetic. There are four main types of green polymer based respectively on: 1.Starch 2.Sugar 3.Cellulose 4.Synthetic materials.


Current and future developments in biodegradable polymers and renewable input materials focus mainly to the scaling-up of production and improvement of product properties. Larger scale production will increase availability and reduce prices of green polymers. Polymers have properties that make them suitable for use in protecting products from moisture, increasing shelf-life and making products easier to dispense. Every biopolymer has its own material-specific properties, e.g., barrier properties such as oxygen permeability.

The barrier properties are relevant to the choice of biopolymers for the packaging of particular products. Bio plastics have very promising prospects for use in pesticide, for packaging in-flight catering products and for packaging dairy products. Starch based polymers have different applications. They are not suitable for packaging liquids (can sustain only brief contact with water) but have good oxygen barrier properties. The sources of starch are found as granules in plant tissue, from which it can easily be recovered in large quantities, obtained from potatoes, maize, wheat and tapioca and similar sources. Starch can be modified in such a way that it can be melted and deformed thermo plastically (injection moulding and extruding).

Cellulose based biopolymers have various applications. Familiar applications of cellophane include packaging for confectionary and cigarettes. The material is gradually falling out of favour due to its high price. The use of cellulose for making packaging material such as cellophane is long established. The material is transparent and has good folding properties. Whether in the form of pure cellulose or of a nitrocellulose coating, the material is wholly biodegradable and can be composted by existing waste processing plant. Synthetic compounds derived from petroleum can also be a starting point for biodegradable polymers, e.g., aliphatic aromatic copolyesters.

These polymers have technical properties resembling those of polyethylene(LDPE).

Although these polymers are produced from synthetic starting materials, they are fully biodegradable and compostable. Some plastics are now referred to as being degradable, oxy-degradable or UV-degradable. This means that they break down when exposed to light or air, but these plastics are still primarily (as much as 98 percent) oil-based and are not currently certified as biodegradable. Biopolymers, however, will break down and some are suitable for domestic composting. Biodegradation is the breaking down of the polymers into CO_2 and water by micro-organisms. In addition some (but not all) of these bio-degradable biopolymers are compostable: they can be put on a home or industrial compost heap and will break down by 90% within six months.



Women's Cell Activities:



In pursuance of UGC (Prevention, prohibition and redressal of sexual harassment of women employees and students in higher educational institutions) Regulations 2015, the Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) of the college has been constituted to deal with the complaints relating to sexual harassment at workplace.



Career Guidance and Placement Cell (CGPC) organizes workshops every year to ensure that the students are equipped with right set of skills and find jobs in domains and organizations of their choice.



Sports and Games Activities: Apart from regular and Annual Athletics, a wide range of games are conducted in the College, such as, Football, Cricket, Basketball, Tennis, Table Tennis, Kho Kho, Weight Lifting and Best Physique. College athletes and teams are trained and sent to various tournaments. These are conducted by the College Sports, Games and Ground Committee. "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." These words of the John the Apostle, eloquently describe the character of Christ Church College Alumni Association, which has been in existence for over a century. It is perhaps the oldest association of the ex-students of any educational –institute in the city. In 1903, Rev. Arthur Crosthwaite, the then Officiating Principal established an association called the 'The College Institutie', with the noble aim of bringing together both teachers and students –past and present to share their experience, views and goals for mutual progress and the betterment of the college. This

organization continued till 1942. In 1944, Rev. R.G. Slater, a very dynamic Principal proposed the establishment of an 'Old Boys Association' exclusively for the college alumni and some 218 old students became its life members in no time. These old boys kept meeting regularly till 1960. Prof. Ninan Abraham rejuvenated and restructured the old boys association and named it 'Christ Church College Alumni Association in 1977. Since then the Association has been very active and has been growing stronger and popular. It has more than 700 members in its fold and holds get-togethers almost every year. The old students not only find it a good platform to interact with each other but relive their days in the college with old teachers and staff in these functions. The functions always witness the scenes of outburst of joy and emotions of old students who recall their 'gurukul's powerful academic environment, rich cultural activities, its unbeaten cricket team and its well dressed distinguished students. The Alumni Association has been publishing its Bulletin Magazine-"The Alumnus" very regularly and it is customary to release it in every annual function.

Important goal of the Alumni Association is to bring to its ranks eminent members who have brought laurels to their alma mater by virtue of shining like stars at the national and international level. It can boast of inviting and felicitating in its functions many eminent personalities who have excelled in different walks of life. Juneja, Associate Professor in Department of Mathematics, who gets it audited by a Senior Chartered Accountant every year and publishes it in "The Alumnus" and also presents it in Annual Functions. Former Heads of the Departments Dr. V K Srivastava and Late Dr. Anil Dixit are credited for nourishing and rearing it to present state. The contributions of a few past and present faculty members like Dr. A C Shukla, Mr. Nalin Kumar, Dr. Sudhir Gupta, Dr. Shalini Kapoor and Dr. Himanshu Dixit in organizing Executive Committee Meetings as well as Annual Functions deserve to be mentioned. 



From the Principal :

Looking before and after

The Christ Church College Alumni Association which came into being in 1977 can, in a sense, be regarded as a third generation plant. In 1903 the then Vice-Principal of the College, the Rev. A. Crosthwaite, who was officiating as Principal during the absence on furlough of the Rev George Westcott, started what was known as the College Institute. The purpose of the Institute was to co-ordinate the activities of the College, and to bring the staff and past and present students into active participation in the life of the College. It organised th annual social gathering with its games, drama and banquet in the Hall.

The College Magazine was one of the first fruits of the Institute. The first issue of the Magazine was published in 1904 and in those days the Magazine was a quarterly publication, very much smaller in size than at present but containing news of the College as well as of the old students. The last recorded meeting of the College Institute took place in August, 1942 when the constitution was amended. No further meetings were held until November, 1943 when a few members met and decided to hold the Social Gathering with tea but not to issue any Magazine in view of the paper shortage.

At the Social Gathering in 1944 a committee was formed to bring into being

a separate Association for the past students. The Old Students Association was quite active till about 1960 but thereafter the membership kept falling and the last meeting of the Association was held towards the end of the last decade.

The Alumni Association which was formed last year is a revival of the Old Students Association, in response to the desire expressed by many old students to have an organisation which would keep alive their connection with the College.

The first 'get-together' in November 1977 was well attended. As decided then the 'get together' will be held on the first Saturday in November every year. A more or less fixed date has been chosen so that members can plan well in advance to attend the 'get together.' The decision of the Association to publish a bulletin called "The Alumnus" is to be welcomed It is not connected with the College Magazine but will carry news about the members and news about the College which is of interest to the members. I hope that the Association will flourish and that it will soon attract many life members.












